

# Why FAFSA/California Dream Act?






- Cost is the reason most often cited by qualified students for choosing not to go to college, yet many students never apply for aid.
  - More than 80% of <u>qualified</u> students who do not enroll in college, cited that its cost and the need for financial aid was a key barrier.

Students who fill out a FAFSA have <u>72% higher odds</u> of persisting than their peers who do not file. Lower income students have a <u>122% higher odds</u> of persisting than their low-income peers who do not file a FAFSA.

# State Schools Chief Tom Torlakson Encourages High School Seniors to Join the "Race to Submit" for College Financial Aid

SACRAMENTO— State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson today encouraged all California high school seniors to fill out applications for college financial aid and also to join the "Race to Submit," which aims to increase the number of students applying for college financial aid.

The California Student Aid Commission oversees the competition, which urges high school seniors and their families to fill out the federal Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and California Dream Act Application (CADAA).

"As a longtime runner, coach and high school teacher, I know an important race when I see one," Torlakson said. "Filling out these financial aid applications is the first step towards college success and helps students qualify for federal, state, and campus-based financial aid."

"The Race to Submit Campaign is a friendly competition to help more graduating high school seniors access the more than \$6 billion in free financial aid available in California," said Lupita Cortez Alcalá, Executive Director of the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC). Letter Sent to All

# IN CALIFORNIA AB 2015 WAS SIGNED BY GOVERNOR BROWN ON SEPTEMBER 19, 2018



#### Assembly Bill No. 2015

#### CHAPTER 533

An act to add Section 51225.8 to the Education Code, relating to pupil instruction.

[ Approved by Governor September 19, 2018. Filed with Secretary of State September 19, 2018. ]

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2015, Reyes, Pupil instruction: information about completion of applications for student financial aid.

(1) Existing law establishes a system of public elementary and secondary schools pursuant to which local educational agencies, including school districts and charter schools throughout the state, provide instruction to pupils in kindergarten and grades 1 to 12, inclusive.

This bill would require, commencing with the 2020–21 school year, the governing board of a school district and the governing body of a charter school, as appropriate, to ensure that each of its pupils receives information on how to properly complete and submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the California Dream Act Application, as appropriate, at least once before the pupil enters grade 12. The bill would provide that the manner in which information is provided pursuant to the bill would be at the discretion of the governing board of the school district or the governing body of the charter school, as appropriate. The bill would specify several types of material that would be required to be provided under the bill. The bill would require the governing boards of school districts and the governing bodies of charter schools to ensure that a paper copy of the FAFSA or the California Dream Act Application is provided to a pupil upon the request of that pupil or upon request of a parent or guardian of that pupil. The bill would also require the governing boards of school districts and the governing bodies of charter schools to ensure that any information shared by parents, guardians, and pupils pursuant to the bill is handled according to applicable state and federal privacy laws and regulations.

Because the bill would impose new duties on school districts and charter schools, it would constitute a state-mandated local program.

(2) The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.



This bill would require, commencing with the 2020 —21 school year, the governing board of a school district and the governing body of a charter school, as appropriate, to ensure that each of its pupils receives information on how to properly complete and submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the California Dream Act Application, as appropriate, at least once before the pupil enters grade 12.

# Riverside County, California #1 in Graduation Rate and Lowest Dropout Rate in California

- #1 in graduation rate among the 10 largest counties in California
- Among the state's largest counties, Riverside County is only county to achieve graduation rate above 90% (CA graduation rate is 84.5%)
- 90.1% of the students who started high school in 2015 in Riverside County (30,101 out of 33,422) graduated with their class in 2019
- #1 in lowest dropout rates among the 10 largest counties in California
- Among the state's largest counties, Riverside County is the only county to drive the dropout rate below 5% (CA drop out rate is 9%)



# Val Verde Unified School District

When Val Verde Unified School District found that low-income students were not completing and submitting financial aid applications, it made financial aid application completion a graduation requirement in 2017.


In the first year of implementation alone, Free Application for Federal Student/California Dream Act Application completion increased 14% points from 69% to 83% with no adverse impact on high school graduation rates.<sup>6</sup>

### **VVUSD 2010-2019 A-G RATE**



### % graduates enrolled in college the fall immediately after high school<sup>5</sup>



## College Affordability



### Require the FAFSA as a Graduation Requirement

### **Could California Be Next?**



AB 1617, as amended, Reyes. Pupil instruction: high school graduation requirements: financial aid applications.

Existing law requires a pupil to complete specified courses as a condition of receiving a diploma of graduation from high school.

Commencing with the 2021–21 school year, and as a condition for granting a grade 12 pupil a diploma of graduation from high school, this bill would require that each governing body of a school district, county office of education, or charter school ensure that each grade 12 pupil who does not opt out, as provided, completes and submits a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or, if the pupil is exempt from paying nonresident tuition under existing law, a California DREAM Loan Program application. completes and submits a form for purposes of the California Dream Act. The bill would authorize the school district, county office of education, or charter school to exempt a pupil who fails to comply with the requirement due to extenuating circumstances. By imposing additional duties on local educational agencies, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.
