

Senate Bill 1644 (Chapter 403, Statutes of 2000) guarantees a California Community College Cal Grant Transfer Entitlement (Cal Grant Transfer Entitlement) award to every student who:

- graduated from a California high school or its equivalent after June 30, 2000,
- was a California resident at the time of high school graduation,
- is under the age of 24 at the time of the transfer [beginning with award year 2007-08, the age limit was increased to under age 28 as the result of AB 2813 (Chapter 822, Statutes of 2006)],
- transfers to a qualifying baccalaureatedegree granting institution from a California Community College during the award year,
- has financial need, and
- is academically eligible.

Beginning with the 2006-07 award year, Assembly Bill 840 (Chapter 43, Statutes of 2006) directs the California Student Aid Commission to make preliminary awards to all applicants eligible for a Cal Grant Transfer Entitlement award and to require each student who receives a preliminary award to affirm, in writing, under penalty of perjury, that he or she meets the eligibility requirements for the program. This bill also directs the Commission to randomly select at least 10 percent of the award recipients for campus-level verification that the recipients meet the program's eligibility requirements before disbursing funds.

This document displays data from the 2006-07 Cal Grant Transfer Entitlement awards made to students who affirmed in writing their eligibility for the program. It also includes data on the awards selected for verification by the institutions.



Note: The numbers in this document reflect the number of recipients notified of their eligibility for an award. To receive Cal Gant funds, California Community College students must enroll at a postsecondary institution with a qualifying baccalaureate-degree program within the award year.

Cal Grant Transfer Entitlement Awards

A&B

Award requirements include financial and basic eligibility, graduation from a California high school after June 30, 2000, California residency at the time of high school graduation, and at least a 2.4 California Community College grade point average. In 2006-07, this program required recipients to be under the age of 24. As of the 2007-08 award year, the age limit is under the age of 28.

Cal Grant A awards provide for full systemwide fees at the California State University and the University of





California, as well as tuition support at qualifying independent four-year California colleges and universities and private career colleges.





Summary of Preliminary Awards and the Cal Grants Selected for Verification

Applicants must meet the eligibility requirements to qualify.

Submitting the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and the Cal Grant GPA Verification Form is the first step for students to be considered for a Cal Grant Transfer Entitlement award. For the 2006-07 award year, 8,810 applicants met this first step and were sent a Preliminary Award letter along with a Cal Grant Transfer Entitlement Certification Form.

To receive further consideration for a Cal Grant award, each Preliminary Award recipient had to provide the following information:

- the month and year the student graduated from high school,
- the name of the high school and the city where it is located.
- the date the student became a resident of California,
- the name of the California Community College from which the student would be transferring during the 2006-07 award year, and
- the name of the school to which the student would be transferring during the 2006-07 award year.

Of the 8,810 Preliminary Award recipients, 6,730, or 76 percent, returned the certification form. Of those 6,730 applicants, 2,344 did not qualify upon further evaluation. From the remaining 4,386 qualifying applicants, 10 percent, or 439, were randomly selected for institutions to verify that they met the program's eligibility requirements.
